“REVEALED THEM TO BABES”

How much theological training must you have to understand the word of God? Some seem to think you must attend a theological seminary, and have letters after your name (e.g. D.D., Lit.D., Ph.D., etc...). And they are still nearly always hypocrites on the subject. They would tell us that Pastor So-and-So cannot possibly be wrong because he has devoted so much of his life to studying God’s

word. It won’t be long before you can find where they disagree with their church (and Pastor So-and-So) on some issue that has embroiled their church in controversy. Many Catholics would tell you that their priest must be right on a matter because he has devoted his life to the church and the study of it’s doctrines. Now press them on a subject they might disagree with the church on... Birth control, celibacy of the priest,

eneration of Mary over Jesus, etc... Now they prove that their priest is only a crutch when they need a little help on their position or belief.

When we read the Bible, we find a book written in the language of the peo-

“THINGS NOT SEEN”

Here is one of those little noted aspects of Scripture that is truly interesting. In Hebrews 11:1 we read that “faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen.” You’ve seen that many times, but had you noticed that this one verse establishes the tone for the remainder of the chapter, **not just in the word faith**, but also in **hope** and things **not seen**...? Let’s skim the chapter and pull out a few points regarding things **not seen**.

In verse three what may be seen was made of what may **not be seen**. Noah was divinely warned of things “**not yet seen**” (v7). In Abraham’s going out, not knowing where he was going, we find one who went not having seen (v8). These died in faith “not having received the promises, but **having seen** them afar off” (v13).

ple, that all might understand. In fact, when the word was revealed, it was not revealed to the mighty intellectuals. As the process of revelation was beginning, Jesus said, "I thank You, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, that You have hidden these things from the wise and prudent and have revealed them to babes." (Mt 11:25) And when we see the division all around us in the religious world, we see the result of people either trying to become too intellectual with the Bible, or disregarding it because of others who claim to be more intellectual. People who apply the plain simple teachings Scripture to everyday life *are told that they err in not having the training necessary to discern such*

things. And please understand that there are well meaning brethren who do the same thing! If you haven't come out of the right school, then you can't possibly understand God's word. We are drifting toward the denominations around us. We must not forget that God's word is best understood by the "babes" who have the humility to accept it as it is, rather than twist it up in a knot of intellectual quibbling.

Education in all areas of life has its place. But when it (in and of itself) is pulled out as a sword

to defeat an opposing position, it has lost benefit and true significance. The Bible is meant for all mankind, and revealed in such a way that all might understand it (Eph 3:3f; 5:17). Otherwise, faith could not come by hearing, and hearing by the word (Rom 10:17). And if that were the case, salvation could only come by a clergy (or intellectuals), rather than an understanding of a simple, powerful message (Rom 1:16). We sing it; but do we really mean it?... "The blessed gospel is for all"!

What they saw, they saw by faith. They actually had *not seen*. Skipping to Moses we find one who "endured as seeing Him *who is invisible*" (v27).

Now we could go back and do the same with the idea of *hope*. But I'll leave that to you.

I want to ask you, where are we to cast our gaze? These ancients were all looking to what could not be seen. Their gaze was provoked by their faith. Their faith allowed them to see what could not be seen with the eyes of flesh. Does our author tell *us* where to look?... "Therefore we also, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us,

and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, *looking unto Jesus*, the author and finisher of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God." (Heb 12:1f) Many evidences exist for what we see as we look to Jesus. And while we cannot see Him with our physical eyes, we have the greatest and clearest of subjects on which to fix our gaze. Of all mentioned in chapter eleven, none had as clear a point of reference as we have in Jesus.

What should that tell us about the life *we* live, and the faith *we* exhibit? And with that I ask you, where are you looking?


